Notes for your mentor

Welcome! The help you give your learner is gold. The best thing you can do is to work together slowly, let your learner make mistakes and be patient!

Here are some of the ways you can help:

Activities: In each activity, the first one is already done, to show you what to do. Talk to your learner about it, then see how they go with the rest. Then check the answers together.

Talk about the topic. This will help you both be ready with the sorts of words and ideas you'll be using.

Read out loud. Let your learner read any words they already know. Then read any new words and sentences out loud to your learner. Next, try reading along together. Go slowly. You can do this lots of times.

Don't jump in as soon as they make a mistake. Pause. Let them hear themselves, and work out if something doesn't make sense. Then they can try again.

Does your learner need glasses? If so, make sure they are wearing them. If you're not sure, check how well they can see the letters on the page. Your learner might need to get some.

Writing or copying. It's OK to try on scrap paper first. Get your learner to check their own work.

More ideas:

- Browse through the workbook yourself before you start.
- Keep work sessions short, watch for when your learner has had enough.

Payload or carrying capacity

What load can you carry?







loaded truck (GVM)

The payload is:

The weight of the loaded truck (GVM)

Take away the weight of the empty truck (Tare mass)

Gives the carrying capacity, or Payload.

Here is an example. T = Tonne:

The **GVM**, or fully loaded weight, is 10T

The Tare Mass, or empty truck weight is 3.5T

The Payload, or carrying capacity, is 6.5T.

To work out a load:

GVM	take away Tare	equals Payload
10T	- 3.5T	= 6.5T

The maths looks like this:

10.0	-
3.5	
= 6.5	

Try another one:

The **GVM**, or fully loaded weight, is 15T The **Tare**, or empty truck weight is 6T What is the **Payload**, or carrying capacity?



Getting help:



- 1. Use a weighbridge when you can.
- 2. Know the weight of each load.
- 3. Ask your truckie mentor to help you.

Keep track of the weight of your load.

You are carrying goods between Sydney and Melbourne. You drop off and pick up goods on the way.

GVM is 10Tonne
Tare is 6.5T
Payload is 3.5T.

Drop off, pick up weights	Copy the weight in the space. The first one is done for you.	Truck weight
GVM 10T	You leave Sydney with a full load. GVM is <u>10 <i>Tonnes.</i></u>	10.0T
Drop 1.5T	At Yass you drop off Your weight is now 8.5T.	10.0 - <u>1.5</u> = 8.5
Pick up 0.5T	At Wangaratta you pick up Your weight is now 9T.	8.5+ = 9.0

GVM 10T	You leave Sydney with a full load. GVM is <i><u>10Tonnes.</u></i>	10.0T

Pick up 0.5T	At Wangaratta you pick up <u><i>0.5T</i></u> Your weight is now 9T.	8.5+ <u>0.5</u> = 9.0
Drop 1T,	At Seymour, your last stop, you drop off <u>17.</u> Your weight is now 8T. It is less than GVM all the way to Melbourne.	9.0- <u>1.0</u> = 8.0
